Introduction & Instructions

Journal All Year!

By writing every day, not only do children become more fluent writers, they grow increasingly comfortable writing for longer stretches of time. They also have a chance to practice important spelling, punctuation, and style skills in context.

While this sounds ideal, have you ever asked your children to write about whatever they want and wondered why such freedom didn't motivate or excite them? Did you watch their faces fall as they stared blankly at that empty white page?

One of the best ways to make sure you stick with a daily writing habit is to have plenty of engaging topics on hand. Kids thrive when they're given boundaries with generous margins. Writing prompts provide the perfect launching point, especially for children who complain, "I never know what to write about!"

This set of 240 writing prompts will carry you through an entire calendar year. It includes a wide variety of topics to inspire your **3rd through 8th graders**. Calendars may be printed in your choice of three formats, each containing the same prompts:

- 12 undated monthly **calendars** for January through December
- 240 writing prompt cards
- 240 writing prompt strips

Overview

Because the same prompts are formatted as calendars, cards, and strips, you can **mix up the presentation** or storage of the prompts. For example, affix the *calendar* to your fridge, make a prompt jar with the folded *strips*, or place the prompt *cards* on a ring. You can even do a little bit of all three—the choice is yours!

The topics in these writing prompt calendars provide the perfect amount of structure to stimulate your young writer while allowing for plenty of imagination! Add them to your writing center, use them for daily warm-ups and journaling, or assign them as a supplement to your writing lessons.

Example writing prompts from the collection:

- Where would you choose to stay for a week: an underwater hotel or an igloo hotel? Why?
- When you are in a bad mood, is it easy for you to snap out of it? Why or why not?
- You are a kitchen appliance. Write about one of your experiences.
- If you could snap your fingers and appear somewhere else, where would you be?
- What emergency supplies should everyone keep in their cars? Why?
- Describe your secret hideaway and tell what you would do there.
- Describe your pet's experience if it went with you on a whitewater rafting trip.

The calendars are not dated, so you can **use them year after year** whenever you need writing inspiration for your elementary students and tweens. Start at any month in the year, printing out only the pages you need.

Prepare the Prompts

Print

This set contains three formats: calendars, cards, and strips. Choose the format you want to try first. If you start with calendars, for example, you can always print cards or strips later. To make it easier for you, all prompts appear in order by month. The January calendar appears first. It is followed by January cards, which are followed by January strips. Next, you'll find the February calendar, cards, and strips, and so on.

When setting up your printer options, choose "Fit" or "Fit to Page" to ensure that the calendars, cards, or strips don't get cut off at the edges.

Option 1: Print on Computer Paper

Plain computer paper—either white or colored—is ideal for calendars and strips. It is also a good option for *cards you plan to laminate*.

- If you print calendars on **white** paper, the children can color in each square as they use the prompt.
- For easy identification, try printing an entire month's prompts on a **single color** of paper. January's calendar, cards, and/or strips might be printed on light blue, for instance, while February's prompts might be printed on red.

Option 2: Print on Cardstock

When laminating is not an option, use cardstock to print CARDS. It will give you sturdier cards that are easier to store.

Cut

After printing cards or strips, cut them out along the dotted lines. A paper cutter will make short work of this task.

Laminate

There is no need to laminate calendars or strips. However, you may want to laminate the *cards* to make them more durable, especially if you plan to store them on rings. This is completely optional, of course.

Store

No matter how you display the calendars or store your cards or strips, make them accessible, along with lined paper, quirky pens and pencils, and stamps and stickers (for embellishing journal pages).

CALENDARS

- Hang the calendars on your refrigerator or bulletin board for daily reference. Optionally, number the monthly grid with your active school dates each month.
- Punch holes in the calendars and insert them in a 3-ring writing notebook. Optionally, provide 12 tabbed dividers, labeled with months of the year.
- Tape or glue the calendar pages into a spiral composition notebook or other journal.

CARDS

- Because there are so many cards, consider printing and storing one month's worth at a time.
- Store cards in a small tin or file box.
- Laminate the cards, punch a hole in the top left corner, and store them on a ring. Since there are 240 cards, you might want to use one ring for each month.

STRIPS

- Because there are so many strips, consider printing and storing one month's worth at a time.
- Fold strips and keep them in a jar, basket, or bucket. There is no special order, so it's fine if they get mixed up!

MAKE A JOURNALING NOTEBOOK

Whether you use calendars, cards, strips, or a combination, help your children keep all their daily journaling in one place!

- Use a slim binder with a see-through cover.
- Fill it with blank lined paper.
- Print a copy of either the colored or black-and-white cover to insert in the front of the binder. (The black-and-white cover has a blank line for their name.)

How to Use the Prompts

There is no single way to use the calendars, cards, and strips. They are flexible, so you can tailor them to your needs. Here are a few options.

Prompts as Freewriting Activities

Journal writing is a non-threatening way to explore different thoughts, topics, and ideas without worrying about proofreading or writing final drafts. This form of journaling is sometimes called freewriting.

Daily journal writing can be intimidating. That's why freewriting is such a wonderful way to let children practice writing without fear of judgment, criticism, or correction. Since this type of daily journaling doesn't get edited or revised, they will be comforted to know that if they "mess up," it won't count against them.

The page may be filled with errors—but that's okay. Resist the temptation to correct it. If you find mistakes, chances are you'll see those same mistakes during formal writing lessons, when you can work together on word choice, sentence structure, and mechanics.

When launching into freewriting, why not try these tips to encourage self-expression and promote tear-free, enthusiastic responses?

- **Encourage children to find their journaling space**. Let them choose a special spot where they feel inspired to dive into their topic.
- **Give free choice**. When children have a say in the topic, they will often write with more enthusiasm, so it's okay to let them choose prompts out of order. They can skip around on the monthly calendar grid, choosing the prompts that most appeal to them. Likewise, your kids can cherry-pick through their file of prompt cards to find a topic that really inspires! Or, when using strips, let them draw 2-3 prompt strips, choose their favorite for the day, and put the others back in the jar.
- **Tell them not to worry about spelling and grammar**. There is no such thing as right or wrong when freewriting.
- Let them make their journal their own. Stickers, markers, drawings, or photos give their journal a unique personality. Journal writing is often more fun when they can let their creative side go a little wild!
- Go for low-pressure freewriting. Let your kids find their own way of doing things.
- Play soft classical music in the background. Music can set a tone for a more fruitful writing session.
- **Give positive feedback**. Comment on increased writing stamina, good attitudes, improved content, or specific things you learned through their journaling responses. Thank them for completing the task. Let them know you appreciate and enjoy their writing, but *don't point out mistakes or offer suggestions*.

Prompts as Extended Writing Assignments

Most of the time, freewriting sessions will prevail when children respond to the daily prompts. But occasionally (once a week or so), you might want to assign a topic as an **extended writing assignment**. The prompt can become a learning lesson that directs kids to write about a particular topic in a particular way. It can be an informal draft with little or no correcting, or it can evolve into a polished final draft.

Extended writing gives the parent or teacher more control over the topic. As a rule, topics that require **explanation**, **persuasion**, or a **line of reasoning** lend themselves best to extended writing assignments. Prompts that invite story writing also work well. Rids will write with greater willingness when the final topic choice is theirs. However, unlike freewriting, extended writing is generally not the time to allow absolute freedom. As a compromise, offer 2-3 appropriate prompts and ask each child to pick their favorite.

Planning Tools

Pre-writing Discussions

In order to fit the prompts into a one-page calendar grid (or a small card or strip), the daily WriteShop prompts needed to be concise. This means there wasn't room to ask the probing questions that help children consider different facets of a topic. But guess what? You can do that with them as part of an oral pre-writing activity!

You won't do this with every topic!

- Pre-writing can actually be counterproductive when using the prompts as freewriting exercises or writing warmups. That kind of writing is intended to help kids write spontaneously in short bursts, so sessions should only last 5-15 minutes.
- On the other hand, if you want students to develop a topic into a composition or essay, pre-writing discussions will help get those creative juices flowing and give them more to write about.

Example writing prompt: What is your favorite mode of transportation? Why?

Expand with questions like these:

- Will you pick something on land, in the air, or on (or under) water?
- Will it be a modern vehicle or something ancient?
- Is it real or imaginary?
- How does that form of transportation make you feel?
- If you could travel to the place of your choice, where would this vehicle take you?

To challenge more proficient writers, add **conditions** such as certain words to use, additional ideas to include, or a set number of sentences or paragraphs to write.

Example writing prompt: What is your favorite mode of transportation? Why?

Add conditions:

- Choose one modern mode and one ancient mode and contrast them.
- Include two ways they are alike and two ways they are different.
- Write one paragraph.
- Include at least three vivid verbs.

Writing Letters

It might be hard for your child to answer a journal prompt in traditional paragraph form. Suggest responding to the prompt in the form of a friendly letter.

Example writing prompt: Describe the strangest meal you ever ate.

Example response could start like this:

Dear Journal,

Have you ever eaten a really weird meal? I have! Last summer, when we visited my aunt, she made pizza. But not your normal pepperoni pizza. This one had corn, tuna, and olives. Olives are OK. I really like corn. And I LOVE tuna sandwiches. But together? On a pizza? Yuck, yuck! At least that's what I thought

Prompts as Oral Activities

Narration

If one or more of your children are not yet writing with confidence, invite them to dictate to you.

- 1. Write it down as they tell their story or share report details.
- 2. After every sentence or two, stop and read what you've written. Continually reviewing as you go helps children remember what they've already said, keeping them more focused.

Chew and Chatter

This activity uses the writing prompt strips as conversation starters around the dinner table. Some prompts lend themselves to stories, so try a Round Robin, where each family member adds a sentence or two to the story as you go around the table. Other prompts will invite discussion about current events, making choices, or setting goals. Draw a prompt from the jar and see where it takes you!

Travel Game

Take a ring of writing prompt cards on a road trip or vacation. Your family can make up stories orally in Round Robin fashion, or respond to the prompts through a lively discussion.

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

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

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
